At last waste dump is to be cleared up

A MOUNTAIN of rubbish which has been making the lives of people in Bromley a misery for years is finally set to be cleared.

The Environment Agency and the London Borough of Bromley have agreed to clear the abandoned Waste4Fuel tip, in St Paul's Cray.

The area's three Conservative MPs, Bromley and Chislehurst MP Bob Neill, Old Bexley and Sidcup MP James Brokenshire and

Orpington MP Jo Johnson, have welcomed the news.

The trio have long been campaigning for the site to be cleared, holding regular meetings with the Environment Agency and ministers at the Department for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs.

In a joint statement they said: "This news will finally bring relief to people who have had to put up with the consequences of this waste mountain.
